

## THE GOVERNOR'S REVISED BUDGET COULD REDUCE COMPENSATION FOR IHSS WORKERS BY MORE THAN \$600 MILLION IN 2008-09

Nearly 400,000 In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) workers provide services to low-income seniors and people with disabilities who live in their own homes to help prevent more costly out-of-home care. Currently, the state shares – along with the county and federal governments – in combined wage and benefit payments of up to \$12.10 per hour for IHSS workers. The Governor's May Revision proposes to cap the state's contribution toward workers' wages at the state's minimum wage – currently \$8.00 per hour – plus \$0.60 per hour for benefits in counties that offer benefits, for a maximum of \$8.60 per hour beginning on October 1, 2008. Counties could continue to provide compensation above the proposed level, but would have to use their own dollars to make up for lost state funding. In addition, the May Revision proposes to eliminate domestic services – including meal preparation, laundry, and errands – for IHSS recipients with less severe impairments beginning on October 1, 2008. This change would reduce average hours of IHSS services provided to approximately 84,000 recipients from 73.8 hours per month to 52.2 hours per month, according to the Department of Social Services. The CBP estimates that the combined impact of these two proposals would be to cut total compensation for IHSS workers by more than \$600 million between October 2008 and June 2009, although this impact would be reduced if counties made up for state dollars that would be lost due to the wage and benefit proposal.

\* Reflects the combined impact of the Governor's May Revision proposals to cap the state's contribution toward IHSS wages and benefits below the current level and to eliminate domestic services for IHSS recipients with less severe impairments. Assumes that counties do not use their own dollars to make up for lost state funding under the proposal to cap the state's contribution toward IHSS wages and benefits. Total lost compensation is greater than estimated state savings under these proposals because of the associated loss of county and federal dollars that would occur, although counties could make up for state dollars that would be lost due to the wage and benefit proposal.

\*\* These counties operate under a single IHSS Public Authority.

Note: Total lost compensation is based on IHSS hours of service provided in each county in April 2008, adjusted to reflect the Governor's proposal to eliminate domestic services for certain IHSS recipients in 2008-09. The number of IHSS workers and compensation levels in each county are from the California Association of Public Authorities. Numbers of workers are as of April 2008 and are rounded to the nearest 10; estimates of lost compensation are rounded to the nearest \$1,000. County estimates may not sum to totals due to rounding.
