MORE THAN 940,000 CHILDREN WOULD LOSE HEALTH COVERAGE IF THE HEALTHY FAMILIES PROGRAM WERE ELIMINATED

On May 26, Governor Schwarzenegger proposed eliminating the Healthy Families Program, which provides health, dental, and vision services to children with family incomes too high to qualify for the Medi-Cal Program. Previously, the Governor proposed to reduce the income limit for Healthy Families to 200 percent of the federal poverty line from the current limit of 250 percent of the poverty line. If Healthy Families were eliminated, 942,000 California children who would otherwise have been covered as of June 30, 2010 – the end of the 2009-10 fiscal year – would not be covered, according to the most recent state estimate available, which likely understates the number of children affected. New estimates released by the Governor on May 29 show that eliminating the program as of August 1, 2009 would reduce General Fund spending by \$369 million in 2009-10, but California also would lose approximately \$685 million in federal matching funds.

A small number of Healthy Families children who were not identified by county were excluded from the analysis. The estimated loss of funds includes General Fund and federal funds. Estimates of affected recipients are rounded to the nearest 10, except for Alpine County, and estimates of loss of funds are rounded to the nearest \$1,000. Estimates may not sum to totals due to rounding.
