Labor Day 2006: California's Job and Wage Growth Lag Despite Economic Recovery

SACRAMENTO — To coincide with Labor Day, the California Budget Project, a nonpartisan policy research group, takes a look at economic trends in the state — and concludes that there is troubling news for California workers. Despite five years of economic recovery, job growth has been weak and workers' wages have stagnated. In the meantime, corporate profits have grown and only the wealthiest Californians have experienced significant gains in income.
